

MEMORIAL RESOLUTION

THEODORE SAUNDERS DUNN

Theodore Saunders Dunn, Associate Professor of Mining Engineering, met an accidental death on the evening of February third. While on his way to attend a meeting of the Faculty Club, he was struck by an automobile and, in all probability, killed instantly.

Professor Dunn was born at Marysville, Missouri, in 1881. Attending the Missouri School of Mines, he received the degrees of Bachelor of Science in 1910, of Master of Science in 1914, and of Engineer of Mines in 1916. From 1914 to 1916 he was Professor of Mining at the South Dakota School of Mines, and from 1920 to 1930 he held the position of Professor of Geology and Mining at the Georgia Institute of Technology. In the intervals between connections with these institutions, Professor Dunn was actively engaged in engineering practice, and obtained wide experience in the geological examination of mineral deposits, and in the mining and treatment of ores and non-metallic minerals. These incursions into the industrial field had given him wide and authoritative knowledge of mineral deposits and of mining and metallurgical practice on the American continents.

During the World War he was commissioned in the Engineer Corps of the Army in 1917. In 1918 he went to France as Captain in the 538th Engineers, 79th Division, commanding transportation troops in Le Havre and Brest, and was later Camp Commander at Le Havre. After the war he was appointed Major in the Organized Reserves, and served at various times six tours of active duty in that capacity.

Stanford had been indeed fortunate to secure the services of a man of Professor Dunn's character, experience and attainments. He came to us in January, 1931, and demonstrated immediately his ability to teach the courses of his special field. His genial personality, in the comparatively short time he was with us, made him many friends who now have a deep feeling of persona loss in his untimely death.

The Academic Council desires to give expression of its appreciation of Professor Dunn, and of its sorrow in his departure from its membership. Be it resolved that this memorial be transmitted to his family and to the Board of Trustees, and that it be entered in the minutes of the Council.
